Teaching Tolerance in a Globalized World: IEA Research for Education




- Tolerance is a core element of global citizenship education: All participating countries and economies included tolerance as an essential component of their global citizenship education curricula.

only grow, making it imperative to prioritize its teaching in schools around the globe.



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
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
